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“...Pray then like this: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil...”

(see Matthew 6:5-15)

As we enter Lent (the 40 days before Easter), let us talk about prayer. Christians have always called this the Lord's Prayer, and it is the Lord's in the sense that he gave it. But it is more accurate to call it the disciples' prayer, or even our prayer. **Prayer, simply put, is talking to God.** In these verses Jesus begins by teaching us how we should not pray (5-8), and then how we should pray (9-13). (1). **Prayer should not be addressed to man but to God** (5,6). The problem is not public prayer, but motives directed toward other people rather than toward God. The point is not where we pray. At issue here is, why we pray – to be seen by people or to be heard by God. Scripture nowhere condemns public prayer, nor individual prayer offered in a public place. Jesus prayed publicly. What Jesus condemns here is having one's private devotions in the most public place, with the intention of being seen and honored by the people. Jesus is condemning hypocrisy. (2). **Prayer should not be measured by multiplication of words but by sincerity** (vv.7,8). This is not a condemnation of persistence in prayer. In Luke 18:1-8 Jesus commended the perseverance of the widow in prayer, and also recommended persistence. He is condemning empty meaningless repetition, and the notion that the best prayers are the longest prayers. (3). **Prayer should follow Jesus' pattern** (9-13). In Luke 11:2-4 we read that the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray. Jesus gave them this prayer as a model. “After this manner ... pray” or “Pray like this.” Jesus did not say, “Pray these exact words every time you pray.” While we usually bring our own needs to God in prayer first, and then perhaps think of God and his interest, Jesus reverses the order. First, thy name, thy kingdom, thy will; then, give us, lead us, deliver us. Praise should always come first. “Hallowed be your name,” means “let your name be holy.” Respect for God's name because God's name signifies His person. Second is a commitment to God's kingdom. This expresses the hope of God's people throughout all of history. Third is submission to God's will. These two are linked in the sense that wherever the kingdom of heaven exerts its presence, God's will is experienced. Fourth is our physical needs. Jesus denounces anxiety about the future, and teaches relying on God for all our physical needs. We are to be concerned only with one day at a time. Fifth is forgiveness of sins. “Debt” means sin. Sixth is temptation. The word for “temptation” can also mean “testing.” We are told in James that God does not tempt His people, so this could mean that when we are tested, we should pray it does not lead us to do evil, which comes from Satan.

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(4). Prayer should affect our behavior, not just our mood (14,15). Prayer may make us feel better. But it is not all there is to our prayer life. Prayer should affect the way we relate to other people. If we have received forgiveness from God, it will be difficult not to extend it to others. Something is seriously wrong if we cannot do this.

As a practical application, I would like to leave you with this outline that I borrowed from another pastor, that I think can be helpful in bringing balance to the way we pray. When we are praying we are asking for God's power to be released and demonstrated, so think "**AMPS**." **Appreciate**. Take time to appreciate the Father's greatness, His love, and His goodness to you. Thank Him, praise Him and worship Him. **Mission**. Pray (by name) for relatives, friends and others who have not yet come to faith in Christ. Pray for missionaries as they spread the Good News around the world. **Physical Needs**. You or others might have financial and health needs. Jesus tells us to ask for God's help and supply. God cares about what concerns us. **Spiritual Needs**. Confess your sins. Ask for a forgiving heart. Pray for your own spiritual health and protection; pray for that of others.

Friends, may we all learn to pray to the Father in the name of the Son by the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
