On The 98th Anniversary of The Armenian Genocide

April 24, 2013 is the 98th anniversary of the Armenian Genocide. Once again fundamental questions arise as to why we continue to observe, and how should we commemorate this blackest time in Armenian history?

We must commemorate in order to keep the memory alive for generations to pay tribute to the one and a half million Armenians who died. It also reminds mankind that genocide is a crime against all humanity, not just the people who lost their lives in this spectacle of one group's merciless treatment of another. The lessons of history can be easily forgotten unless there are those who will cry out against the injustices of the past.

We must also remember the past in order to "escape from it," to learn the lessons of history so that future generations will not repeat them. Genocide does not occur in a vacuum; it is the awful fruit of a gradually deteriorating disregard of human life.

Each generation must teach the next the total history of the Armenian people, including the genocide history. We must, also, remain vigilant to keep the historical records of the genocide intact. Because there are forces at work to deny the facts; we must fight against their efforts to rewrite history.

Moreover, nations, like individuals, must live with a sense of justice, righteousness and human dignity. Just as there are laws, which govern our physical universe, there are moral laws that govern the world and mankind. For example, true and lasting peace cannot be achieved without justice. Crimes cannot go unpunished. Otherwise, the whole world would be filled with rapists, thieves, criminals and murderers. This is why for every crime there is a punishment. It is a law that society has created to protect the weak, children, elderly and innocent people.

Yes, we must continue to search for justice for Armenian people so that their martyred ancestors will not have died in vain. Only if and when this is achieved, will the world be truly honoring the living as well as paying tribute to the dead!


