



Summer is a Gospel Reminder "If then you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on the earth." (Colossians 3:1-2)

Every season is God's season, but summer has its special power. Tragically for too many Christians, summer is the season of spiritual drift. With days off of school for the kids, summer vacation plans with the whole family, our daily and weekly routines loosen up for the duration of the summer. As the days get longer and hotter we are tempted towards spiritual laziness. Church no longer becomes a priority, our Bibles go unread, and prayer time is diminished. This is why we cannot take a season off from making every effort to grow in godliness.

But is this God's intention for us during the summer? Is it a constant battle between leisure time and time with God? Are the two mutually exclusive?

I believe God does some new things in the summer. We should wonder and ask why God does these things. When we see things in a new perspective we can see that every season belongs to God and how He can use it for our benefit and His glory.

1) He makes the daylight longer. Why? Some of it has to do with crops and birds and photosynthesis. But it also has to do with spending more time outdoors and hanging out where you might be able to talk to people who in the winter were hidden away in their homes. Long days show the glory of a God "who is light, and in whom there is no darkness at all." (1 John 1:5)

- 2) He makes the temperature warmer. Why? Well this too has to do with flowers and trees and crops, because he loves us. But there are other reasons. He does it so that we will spend time outside and meet people in the neighborhood and at the park that we would not meet in the cold of winter. He also does it so that we will go outside after dark, in the cool of the evening where he has his glory on display in the stars. "The heavens declare the glory of God, the skies proclaim the work of his hands." (Psalm 19:1)
- 3) Schools are closed for the summer. Why? One reason is to reduce stress on kids and families. It also gives families opportunities to travel and see God's handiwork in another place whether it is 15 or 1500 miles away. Mountains, lakes, rivers, plains, oceans and even cities reveal the works of God. The opening up of our summer schedules should allow us to get out of our comfort zone and enjoy God's creation.

Summer is for seeing and sharing God. Don't let the thought that summer is a spiritual void overtake you. That is not how God views things. He is displaying glories to be seen and worshiped. His summer "kindness is meant to lead to repentance" (Romans 2:4). So let's join God in his love for people in the summer and make it a fresh meeting with Him in the light of His love.

Capital Fund and New Roof

The work on the replacement of the flat roofs of our building and the rooftop heating and cooling units is progressing successfully. As approved at the Congregational Meeting, the Church has borrowed \$100,000 from the Armenian Missionary Association of America to fund the work. The loan is to be repaid in five years and the Church was granted very reasonable terms. We gratefully acknowledge the generosity of the AMAA for making this possible.

We have identified a general contractor, Arman & Sons, that has agreed to perform the work for about \$95,000 (projects of this size almost always involve additional unexpected costs). We are very fortunate one of our trustees contacted the owner, with whom he has previously worked, and received this very favorable pricing. The other bids we received were substantially higher. We expect the contractor will start work in October and complete the work in about two weeks.

The Church has received contributions to the Capital Fund of over \$34,000. We will be continuing our fund-raising work. We appreciate the generosity of those who have already contributed, and will be relying on their pledges for future contributions. We ask that those who have not yet contributed make a contribution very soon as part of a five year pledge commitment, and be as generous as they can.
