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

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Christmas is a culmination in many ways. With the holiday season in full bloom, amidst the Christmas trees, gingerbread cookies, eggnog, the holiday shopping and gift-wrapping, everything boils to a fever pitch. All these activities reach their climax on Christmas day as we gather together with family, give one another gifts, relax and reflect on another year gone by. Christmas marks the end of another year, remembering God's blessings and looking forward to a new year to come, wondering what God will have in store for us. Even the Christmas story itself is a culmination. Angels appear to Mary and Joseph to proclaim the coming of the Christ Child. The young couple sets off on a journey to Bethlehem, not knowing where they will stay or what will happen to this child that is coming. Wise men in the East discover a special star, proclaiming the birth of a very important King, so important they set off on a long journey in search of this King of Kings. A host of angels proclaim to the Shepherds, "Today in the town of David a Savoir has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord!" (Luke 2:11)

The birth of this child is special in many ways. Not only is this the advent of the long-awaited Christ, the Messiah, the specially Anointed One of God whom God's people have pined for and prophets spoke about so long ago. But this is "Christ the Lord" meaning God himself has come. Here finally after centuries of waiting, is the Immanuel, God with us. It is great news to be shared and proclaimed, but the good news doesn't end with Jesus' birth. It is news too spectacular to say all at once. Day after day will pour forth more and more about the life of this child. Act after act will reveal piece by piece that this

child shares the divine identity of Yahweh. Page by page in the Gospels, story after story, will show us more and more that this one who is so very much man is also truly God.

The Word who "became flesh" (John 1:14) is the one and the same Word who was in the beginning with God, and was God, and all things were made through him (John 1:1-3). Indeed, the Christmas story doesn't start with the Shepherds, the Wise men or even Mary and Joseph. It began long ago, all the way back to the beginning of creation itself. In many ways the birth of Christ is a culmination of all of creation and this is the great spectacle for those shepherds and wise men to witness, and it is the wonder we ourselves, who have lived our blessed lives knowing this truth, should aspire to experience again and again each Christmas.

There is more to the story, as with everything with God, it doesn't end there but just begins. It is not just that God is with us in this Christ child; it gets better, he has come to rescue us. It is found encoded in the name of the child himself. Jesus, in Hebrew Yeshua, means "God saves" The same God that sent Moses as his instrument to save His people from Egypt. Who sent Joshua and the judges as His instrument to rescue his people in the past. He now comes himself, in Jesus, to save us from our past, present and future sins. Our celebration of Christmas, in essence is a celebration of our salvation, begun, completed and preserved by Jesus himself. Sin could not stand against this lowly child born for us in Bethlehem.
