Upper Elementary/Middle School Sunday School Adventures

The elementary/middle schoolers have continued the study of Parables that they began last year. We are finding that Jesus's stories provide lessons that are readily applied to our own lives, as we think about ourselves and how we relate to family, friends, teachers and others, in different situations. Whether we are looking at "good Samaritans," "prodigal sons," or the nature of "salt and light" in the world, our discussions often result in insights that help us look at our own values and conduct as Christians. The class is in the process of writing their own parable, an amusing activity involving characters named Sponge Bob, Squidward and associates. We can only hope that this rambling parable will end one day, and that these characters will eventually find their way to fulfilling what was chosen as our intended lesson: be kind and respectful to others.

The class is also continuing their community service activities. We have been collecting money for Artavazd Mangasarian, the Armenian child that the Sunday school is sponsoring this year. So far we have collected \$124. Added to this is \$65 in proceeds from our Christmas ornament sale. Once again the class created and decorated ornaments that were sold during the Christmas luncheon.

On January 29, our class and one high schooler traveled to Manoogian Manor for a visit with residents. The children brought along cookies that they had baked at church on the previous Sunday. This is always a meaningful outing for our class, as the Manoogian Manor residents are always happy to talk to our young people, and it is a chance for students to connect and share with others. They are able to take what they learn in Sunday school out into the world.

It's May!! Spring is in the air. We open our windows so our homes will be filled with fresh air. We do spring cleaning, plant spring bulbs, add new things to our wardrobe and plan some fun family vacations and get-togethers. Fresh beginnings and so much to look forward to.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of our church. One hundred years ago my great grandparents came here to Detroit to make a fresh start. A people coming to a new country to give their children the opportunity to experience freedom. Free to practice their religion, free to share memories of the towns and villages they called home and free to continue their rich heritage. A people who came to a country not speaking its language, being of modest means, greatly humbled due to mans' inhumanity to man and yet so inspired to create the foundation and build the church that so many of us still call our church home today. A people still strong in their belief in the teachings of Jesus Christ despite all they and their families had been through. Wanting their families to be able to come to a place of worship so they too could learn this unwavering faith. A people who desired a fresh beginning.

From its earliest days, I am proud that The Armenian protestant church felt it so important to have a Sunday school for its children. A place for children to come and build their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. This church offered something that could not be found in any other "established" church. This church had within its midst people whose faith made them survivors. Witnesses to the blessings of God. We, as children, saw each Sunday survivors happy to be amongst friends, happy to share stories of the "old country", happy to share their rich heritage through food and family traditions but most importantly able to share how their faith in Christ made them strong, made them survivors. Some of these survivors had the look on their face of freedom, that look you get when you take in your first breath of fresh spring air, a look of peace.

Much has changed over the years. These survivors are no longer with us. But, their stories and traditions still remain a part of us. Their lives and stories are found intertwined in the Sunday school lessons we teach today. We, as teachers, share our ancestors' stories of survival and their faith in Christ that brought them through horrific times to an unknown country; witnessing to each child the strength we saw in a people. As the disciples witnessed the miracles of Jesus Christ, we witnessed how the blessing of survival brought a people closer to God.

As with all churches, ours is not perfect. I wish at times that our church could offer all that some find missing. But, I feel a great sense of gratitude to those who came before us. I feel it is of great importance and an honor to pass on to this generation of children those inspirational moments of our history that will strengthen their faith. To those who once called this place home, I welcome you back and to become involved again in the life of this church. If you have young children with a thought of introducing them to Sunday school; If you are a leader with the desire to lead youth; If you have learned from other places of worship or been a survivor of life's unpredictable journey, this generation of children needs to know and learn from you. Be that face that this generation looks back on with inspiring gratitude. Your story or gifts may be just what this generation needs to witness. It's spring again and a time for new beginnings or maybe a return to freshen things up.
