Dear Members and Friends:

In our society, the second Sunday in May has been set aside as Mother's Day. A day set aside to honor mothers was the suggestion of Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Anna wanted to honor her mother and all mothers.

The first Mother's Day church service was held on May 10, 1908, in her mother's home town of Grafton, West Virginia. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation making Mother's Day a national observance "as a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country."

We should be careful not to idealize motherhood. Because there are all sorts of mothers. Some have been mothers, but should not have been. Mothers are very special people, but they are people, and to be a mother is not necessarily to be virtuous.

Motherhood is a calling, not an inheritance. The proof of motherhood is in the divine calling to educate her children. Great is the mother who bears a child in order to become a mother, and not become a mother because she's had a child. Motherhood is something more than a biological phenomenon. Motherhood is pure and unbounded love. A mother, like a seed, implants her own life in the lives of her children. She surrenders her own being to bring forth new life. She denies herself, sacrifices and gives of her resources in order that greater things might come from her.

It is not easy to start with a baby in a cradle and see him or her through infancy, and childhood, and adolescence. For most children, life found its early direction under the influence of someone called "mother." In all probability, when they took their first steps "mother" was there. When they spoke their first word "mother" was there. When they first started learning to read and write "mother" was there. When they got sick "mother" was

100th Anniversary of the Republic of Armenia

We are approaching the 100th Anniversary of the Republic of Armenia. On May 28, 1918 the Armenian people regained statehood with the creation of the first independent state since 1375. For the first time in almost six centuries the Armenian people, with the founding of the Republic of Armenia, were able to begin the process of controlling their individual and collective destinies. As a landlocked small remnant of historical Armenia, this newly-founded republic became the base on which modern Armenia continues its existence.

May 28, 2018 is the Centennial Anniversary of Armenia. On Sunday, May 27, 2018, the Armenian Congregational Church of Greater Detroit will mark the Centennial Anniversary of the Republic of Armenia during the Morning Worship Service.

On Remembering

(Memorial Day Reflections)

There is hardly a nation or a culture that does not have its memorial observations. To recognize one's roots, to remember where one came from and those who have precede them, is a natural and germane aspect of being human.

In America what used to be called "Decoration Day," from the practice of decorating the graves of those who had died, is now called "Memorial Day." In 1874, Congress made May 30 a national legal holiday and called it "Memorial Day." We have toyed with that date, as have with so many others, and this year *Memorial Day* is on May 28.

The day began as a day of memory of those who had died in the armed services on both sides in the "War Between the States." It grew to include those who had died in subsequent wars. But the day has grown even more in its implications to include in its commemoration all those who have gone before. It is not only a day of collective national memory, but of personal memory and appreciation as well.

On this Memorial Day as we stand in the long succession of generations, let us remember those who have gone before us. And as we remember, let us remind ourselves that one day we will be among those being remembered! How are we going to be remembered?
