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From the Ministers Desk

Dear Members and Friends:

What is the future of the Church? Not just the Armenian Congregational Church of Greater Detroit, but any other church. Nobody knows what the future will hold. But we know who holds the future. God the Almighty and the Omniscient is in charge of everything that takes place. I also believe that the answer partly lies in how each and every individual Christian bears witness to the transforming love of Christ. This means that we all are called to demonstrate and testify to the work that Christ is doing in our lives.

There are several implications which must be drawn from this assessment if we are to appreciate how radically it alters most of our views of the church.

The first implication is that Christian faith is based upon a personal encounter with Jesus Christ. We are capable of testifying only to those things we know firsthand. In every court of law eyewitness testimony is the most worthy of believing. Such has likewise been the case of Christian faith.

The second implication is that every Christian is an ambassador for Christ. This means that we are personally responsible for our relationship to God. We cannot base our faith on belonging to the church. We cannot base our faith on another person, be they spouse, parent or pastor. Christian faith is between God and us.

The third implication is that our faith is always made visibly by our action. There must be consistency between what we say and what we do. The world listens to our faith by how we live.

All of the foregoing things do not imply that we must be perfect in word and deed. God does not expect us to be perfect before representing Him. He requires that we desire Him with all our hearts and pursue with all strength the objective of growing more Christ-like day by day.

Still, another implication of the base thesis is that we are required to share our testimony. We must be alert for opportunities to speak of Christ in us. We must be sensitive to the opportunities as they arise each day. They will most frequently arise in the form of the midst of our acquaintances. We must respond to them completely.

To respond completely, we must address the need and speak of God's grace. We must tell how Christ is our peace and how this offer is extended to them. We must have a passion for compassion. We must be willing to identify them, walk with them.

The future of our church rests upon how we answer these questions: Do we really believe Jesus as our Savior and Lord? Are we willing to tell others of his love?

Board of Trustees Report

Dear Members:

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, the following is a brief report on the activities of the Board over the summer months.

The Board has continued to focus on its stated objectives for 2018, including: (1) balancing the budget; (2) evaluating church contracts and operations; (3) preserving and growing the intangible property including cash and investment accounts; (4) completing ongoing repairs, accrued maintenance and planning of the ACC building and facilities; and (5) supporting our church's general interests including assisting and supporting the Pulpit Committee's activities.

In furtherance of these objectives, the ACC remains on budget for 2018 as operational costs have been brought closer in line with revenues. Consequently, less demand has been placed on investment accounts to meet operating needs. These investments have shown steady growth in value, accordingly. Repair and maintenance activities continue. Most recently, all locks on the church building were changed to ensure security and access. In the coming month, roof repairs and facia board replacement on the western end of the church is expected to be undertaken and completed. Substantial plumbing repairs and replacement of audio equipment in the sanctuary and social hall are also being planned. With regard to the general interests of the ACC, the board has and continues to plan for and support the Pulpit Committee's search for a senior pastor, and the interim filling of the pulpit, including arranging honorarium.

The foregoing is, of course, only an overview of the Board's recent activities. Please always feel free to contact me or any trustee to further discuss.

The Holy Translators

The month of October is known as "The Cultural Month", and rightly so, for it is within this month that the Armenian Church celebrates the memory of

our holy translators. The Golden Age of Armenian literature, the fifth century, and the subsequent glorious periods of literary flourishments were productive because of the work of our translators. St. Sahag and St. Mesrob should be remembered together as the cofounders of Armenian literature and education as leaders of the group of Holy Translators.

At the beginning of the fifth century and before then, there was no Armenian Bible, and this was a real handicap in his missionary activities. Church services were conducted at that time in foreign languages, Greek and Syriac (languages of the Assyrians). It is obvious that in these circumstances the people could understand little of anything. It soon became apparent to St. Mesrob that oral teaching was not enough and that in order to Christianize the people it was necessary to place in their hands the writings of the Church Fathers, and especially, the Holy Bible. His primary motive was a religious one and thus from this, the alphabet was established, religious literature and all Armenian literature flourished.

The Mesrobian characters was 36 in number. (The Armenian alphabet consists today of 38 characters; two letters being added in the Middle Ages.) After the invention of the alphabet, a host of disciples were trained under the unfailing guidance of St. Sahag and St. Mesrob.

This group of Scholars came to be known as "the Holy Translators" or "Soorp Tarkmanitchk" as they are called in Armenian. These Holy Translators have been a source of inspiration across the centuries to others, who in turn, as "Minor Translators" have enriched the Armenian culture.
