# Lenten Message

Dear Members & Friends,

The month of March ushers in the Lenten Season, which is the perfect time for self-examination and repentance. Lent is time for us Christians to confess our sins and pray for forgiveness. It is time for spiritual revival in anticipation of welcoming our Risen Lord and Savior at Easter. I have taken the main idea for this month's article which emphasizes the importance of Repentance, from the sermon I preached a couple weeks ago about King David. I thought if the subject was worth preaching, it probably is worth repeating it in writing.

Many of you are familiar with King David's escapades with a woman named Bathsheba. The record of 2 Samuel Chapter 11 describes a king who abused his power in such a way as to commit two heinous crimes, namely adultery and murder. To help King David realize the magnitude of his offense, the prophet Nathan told the story of a poor man who only had a single lamb that he loved deeply. Then came along a rich man who had many flocks and dispossessed the poor man of the only lamb he had. When King David became indignant at that rich man's behavior, Nathan pointing his finger at David said, "You are that man" (2 Samuel 11:7).

After this confrontation with the Prophet Nathan, David became fully aware of the gravity of his sin and the weight of his guilt, and wrote Psalm 51 which is an expression of a heart overwhelmed by sin and shame, humbled and broken by remorse, and yet saved from despair by faith in God's mercy and His willingness to forgive.

David confesses his sin in verses 3-5 by saying, "I acknowledge my transgressions." David's confession is sincere because he does not try to excuse his sin and does not attempt to blame others for his indiscretion. In contrast, Adam blamed God and Eve for his sin (see Genesis 3:12). David's sense of personal accountability is plainly visible here. He did not try to evade his responsibility by ascribing his moral failure to unavoidable circumstances or an instinctive urge.

David appeals to God's grace and mercy (verses1-2). "Have mercy upon me O God according to your great compassion, blot out my transgressions." The word "blot out" literally means to erase or wipe off. David pleads with God to erase the record of his sins. When you write something you don't want others to read, you blot it out and thus what you have written disappears forever.

"Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity" (verse 2). David came to a place where he realized how ugly and offensive his sin was in the eyes of God and sought to be released from his guilt. He cast himself completely on God's mercy. "Purge me with hyssop and I shall be clean" (verse 7). Hyssop is an aromatic plant that grows everywhere in the Holy Land. The local people dry its leaves, boil them and drink the liquid which is known to clean the intestines.

In Old Testament times, when an Israelite became ceremoniously "unclean" by touching a leper, he had to submit to a cleansing ritual. He went to the temple where a priest dipped a bunch of hyssop in water and sprinkled the offender with water seven times. The concept that sin causes a separation between God and the sinner is emphasized in verses 9-11. David does not wish to be severed from God forever and yearns for the restoration of the relationship he once had with his Creator. David pleads with God not to deprive him of the Holy Spirit because he is aware of the Spirit's role in moral regeneration. The Psalmist now pleads for the restoration of joy of which he had been robbed by sin. In spite of his transgressions, God forgave David, because he found in him the willingness to Repent, and start a new, no matter how far he had fallen.

During this season of Lent, may we like King David, acknowledge our sins and seek the inner cleansing that God provides through the Holy Spirit, who penetrates our weak souls and with His potent powers reconciles us with God the Father. AMEN
