Synopsis of the Armenian Message

(Luke 3:1-18)

In this section of Luke's narrative, we meet John the Baptist. He is preaching and baptizing in the Jordan area. John's ministry was in fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy. His message was blunt and straightforward. He did not mince words, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath?" (v.8), and "The ax is at the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire" (v.9). These are not words you would hear any preacher use today, but nevertheless, the response was immediate. His hearers ask him what to do to show their repentance. His response is direct and practical. Those who have much, they should show their love for their neighbors by sharing with them their material possessions and their food. Those who are hording money (tax collectors) for themselves in crooked ways and by cheating others, should stop lusting after money and start being honest in their dealings. For those who have the power (soldiers), they should not use their authority to extort money from people and they should not accuse people falsely. They are to be fair and content with their pay. John was sent to prepare and warn the people ahead of the coming Christ who was going to "Baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire." And who was coming with "His winnowing fork in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." (vv. 16-17).

In response to John's message, is there any changes you should be making in your life as far as sharing what you have, doing your work well and honestly, and being content with what you have?
